What's Going On?

In 1973, a group of fifteen foresighted Indian Hill residents joined together to preserve a beloved building at the heart of the Village -- the Little Red Schoolhouse. With the help of over 100 families as Founders, the deteriorating Schoolhouse was repaired and restored. You may have noticed the names of the Founders which appear in calligraphy on the blackboard in the vestibule of the Schoolhouse. Then known as the Indian Hill Historical Museum Association, the goal of the fledgling organization was "to collect and contain here the history of Indian Hill and its region and to be an educational center."

Over time, the Historical Society's focus has shifted from being a museum to working "to chronicle and preserve the history of this Village through photographs and research" and preserving historic buildings such as Buckingham Lodge, the Elliott House, and other landmark properties. The Historical Society's monthly meetings and programs featuring speakers on the history of Indian Hill and unique aspects of life in the Village help to promote its educational mission.

Next year, 2023, marks the Historical Society's 50th anniversary, and we are gearing up to celebrate our success in "Keeping Indian Hill's Past and Present Alive for Tomorrow." What will the next fifty years bring? To guide our path into the future, the Society is embarking on a Strategic Plan that will help us make the best use of our resources to carry out our mission. Answering the Call of the Wild: The Remarkable Life of Cathryn Hilker

Original Date: 9/18/22, rescheduled date 10/2/22

Author Kathy Merchant discussed her book about Cathyrn Hilker and her passion for protecting the cheetah. Cathryn Hilker grew up in Mason, OH on a farm. Her life's path took her to Africa in the late 1950s with Dr. Byron Bernard (a veterinarian at the Cincinnati Zoo). She stayed in Africa and joined the Chimpanzee Project in Belgium Congo. After several years, she returned to the US and became a schoolteacher. In the late 1970s, Cathryn went to Al Oeming's Alberta Game Farm and met his cheetah, Tawana. Al and Tawana toured Canada visiting schools to educate children about wildlife. This encounter changed Cathryn's life and set her on a mission to save this endangered species. Two cheetahs were born at the Columbus Zoo in 1981. Cathryn asked to raise one of them, and the cub, Angel, moved to her farm! Much as Al Oeming had done, Cathryn started visiting schools with Angel and ultimately created the "Angel Fund" to support a variety of cheetah conservation projects for both wild and captive cheetahs. She worked closely with the Cincinnati Zoo and helped to create the "Cat Ambassador" program to promote all things cheetah.

In honor of Cathryn, "Chris", a 3-year-old female cheetah from the Cincinnati Zoo, made a special visit to the Little Red Schoolhouse for this event. It was exciting to see this beautiful animal up close and learn about this species from the Zoo's handlers.

Cathryn answered questions at the end of Kathy's slideshow. She told some stories of her experiences with these magnificent animals. It was a memorable afternoon at the Little Red Schoolhouse.


Tecumseh & The Prophet, with Author Peter Cozzens




Indian Hill Authors and More ...

As author Anna Quindlen states, "Books are the plane, the train, and the road. They are the destination and the journey. They are home." The Hauck Library at the Indian Hill Historical Society contains many volumes, some of which are authored by past and present residents. Shelved at Buckingham Lodge, they cover a variety of subjects. Each book offers an opportunity to expand readers' horizons.

Of interest to children, <u>Elbey Jay</u> was written in 1964 by Joyce Attee and illustrated by Marjorie Applegate, Marjory Ewell, and Ede Schmidt. It featured a blue jay, and all sale proceeds went to the Indian Hill Green Areas Fund. Youngsters will enjoy the pictorial <u>Tower City Trains</u>, depicting the awesome O scale train layout created by former Historical Society trustee Bill Bramlage.

Art, health, poetry, antiques, politics, and photography are examined by other authors. Marjorie Applegate's <u>Sculpture</u> provides a record of her stone carvings and was presented to her on her 70th birthday. Denise Davis, M.D., writes about <u>Health, Wellness and Restoration</u>. Two poetry collections by Deborah Pope delve into the natural environment and human connections. A treasured travel tome is


Julius Fleischmann's Footsteps in the Sea, which describes the 1931 aroundthe-world voyage on his 225-foot yacht, Camargo I, and the artifacts collected along the way. Later Fleischmann's maps of the sea lanes of the Pacific Ocean were used by the U.S. military during World War II. One of Dorothy Snowden Rowe's two books in the library, At the End of the Pond, recounts her summers spent in Weekapaug, Rhode Island, and even contains a few seafood recipes. Mary Krombholz, antique doll expert and collector, researched and photographed European dolls, toy museums and doll factories. She wrote seven books about them, the crown jewel of which was the 640-page 500 Years of German Dollmaking, a comprehensive volume with over 3000 pictures. Senator Robert A. Taft's Foreign Policy for Americans 1951 espouses his political views on the U.N., the Russian Menace, and the battle against Communism. Natural Impressions is a collection of the extraordinary photographs of Priscilla "Prissy" Connell, a wildlife connoisseur and nature enthusiast whose work was once featured on a U.S. postage stamp.

Other authors' books focus on genealogy, history, and horticulture. Simon Elliott compiled <u>The Elliott Families 1762-1911</u>. IHHS President Emeritus Ginny White's books provide fascinating resource material for anyone interested in the Village. <u>From Camargo to Indian Hill</u> traces the history of the area from its origins to its emergence as a residential community for prominent Cincinnatians in the 1920s and beyond. <u>Treasured Landmarks of Indian Hill</u> presents the houses, barns, and structures that preceded the area's 20th century development. Margaret Rowe's <u>Living with Our Flowers Through Four Seasons of the Year</u> was published in 1932. It describes the work that plants require month by month and season by season. Although some of her advice is now out of date, much of it still resonates, such as "Never let weeds come."

Three novels by Indian Hill authors can be found in the Hauck Library. Marifran Dirkes' Flying Into Limbo is a mystery/drama set in the medical world. The thriller Carrington House, by John Roberts, takes place in a boarding school in the eastern U.S. and deals with hazing, harassment, and cultural isolation. Dede Rede examines how history affects several interconnected women in Communist Czechoslovakia in Velvet Spring. All three were well received by reviewers. Autobiographies comprise the largest component of the library's collection of books by Indian Hill authors. Two are by sports icons. Pete Rose's My Story, written with Roger Kahn, describes the Hit King's career, mannerisms, and gambling. Paul Brown's contributions to football are detailed in The Paul Brown Story, written with Jack Clay. The architect of many innovative football strategies, Brown is revered as "the father of the game." He coached at Massillon High School and the Ohio State University and later founded and coached the Cleveland Browns and the Cincinnati Bengals. Other volumes document the lives and careers of local titans. Lawrence H. Rogers's two books, History of U.S. Television and Orlando Shoot Out, relate the early days of television and his dealings with well-known broadcasting executives. Mending Broken

Hearts by noted cardiologist Donald C. Harrison, M.D., describes his outstanding accomplishments and the highlights of his 50-year medical career in California and Cincinnati. For those interested in criminal justice, William F. Hopkins' Murder is My Business provides the life story of an outstanding defense lawyer and accounts of his most famous cases. Edward J. Neyra's Cuba Lost and Found is a compelling narrative about the young immigrant's struggle to find his way in a new country, his achievement of the American dream, and his reconnection with his homeland. Life on Thin Ice recounts the tales of Bob Greiwe's life in the 1930s, 40s and 50s during his youth in Indian Hill. Greiwe is an award-winning interior designer, writer, and painter.

This sampling of volumes from the Hauck Library indicates some of the intriguing fields that Village residents have examined. These local authors' writings will be saved for posterity. Anyone with information about other Indian Hill authors is invited to contact the Historical Society at its office, Buckingham Lodge.

Books like these promote knowledge. In the spirit of exploring and preserving the past of this area, the Indian Hill Historical Society is hosting a presentation by a nationally recognized author, Peter Cozzens. Mr. Cozzens will discuss his gripping historical narrative, <u>Tecumseh and the Prophet</u>, highlighting the story of two famous Shawnee brothers who tried to unite Native American tribes and deter the advancement of settlers on the frontier in the late 18th and early 19th centuries. The event will be held at the Indian Hill High School Auditorium on Thursday, October 27 at 7:00 p.m. Please plan to attend and hear about this compelling saga. And plan a visit to the Hauck Library at Buckingham Lodge!
