The Story of Jay Trump – an Amazing Horse

Jay Trump, a horse from humble beginnings, took his Indian Hill owner, Mary C. Stephenson, and jockey, Crompton "Tommy" Smith, on the "ride" of a lifetime. He was the first American bred, owned, and ridden horse to win the prestigious (and harrowing) English Grand National Steeplechase in Aintree, England in 1965. Many IH residents accompanied them for this exciting event and came home with big winnings, as Jay Trump started the race with odds of 100 to 6!

Local resident, Judy Mitchell, gave a very entertaining and informative history of Jay Trump's training, victories, and subsequent retirement at Meshewa Farm, as well as her own remembrances of riding in Indian Hill. Mike Pfister, son of one of the IH residents who journeyed to Aintree for the race, provided additional details of this exciting day. A five-minute film recap of the race was thrilling to see, too.

destruction which occurred when these cultures collided as one empire began, and another began to disappear.





Winding Creek Farm ~ 100 Years and Counting

In the early 1920s, a young Julius Fleischmann, Jr., aka "Junkie", envisioned building an estate with a magnificent manor home surrounded by sprawling land with gardens, fountains, farm buildings, fox hound kennels, and quarters for staff (to cite a few of the incredible attributes of this farm). He purchased 1,600 acres with rolling hills and a winding creek in Indian Hill. It was a large swath of land. The property extended from Blome (then it was spelled Bloom) and Spooky Hollow roads (including Finley & Spooky Ridge Lanes), to Blome & Kugler Mill roads, to Given Road. Construction began in 1923. (Junkie was a bachelor and 23 years old when the project started!)! It took 3+ years for the vision, as detailed by architect Stanley Matthews of Glendale and New York City, to become reality. The numerous buildings required great attention to detail and quality workmanship. Virtually all of the cut limestone used for the buildings came from the winding creek itself.

and the "winding creek" are visible in the right side of the photo.





From the President:

The American Flag

The Fourth of July marks the high point of summer, and Indian Hill residents celebrate with joyous festivities and flag-waving patriotism. The American Flag is proudly displayed at homes, in parades, and on flagpoles. More than a decorative piece of fabric, it evokes Americans' pride in their nation and expresses the ideals of democracy, freedom, and justice. The flag has other monikers: The Stars and Stripes, Old Glory, and the Star-Spangled Banner.

In 1777, Congress passed a Flag Resolution establishing guidelines and definite colors for the flag. No particular design was specified, and many different flags were produced with stars, stripes, and other motifs in the country's infancy. For years, it was thought that a Philadelphia seamstress, Betsy Ross, sewed the first American flag, but this story has not been substantiated and is now believed to be false. As new states were added to the Union, new flags were created. During the War of 1812, the 15-star, 15-stripe flag inspired



Francis Scott Key to write the poem which later was set to music and became the national anthem, *The Star-Spangled Banner*. There have been 26 modifications to the flag since 1777, and the current flag is the 27th design. In 1958 when Hawaii and Alaska became states, the 50-star flag was designed by 17-year-old Robert Heft of Lancaster, Ohio, as a high school history project. He submitted the design to his teacher, received a grade of B-, and then sent it to his congressman. When Heft's flag was chosen over 1500 other entries, the teacher changed Heft's grade to an A -- I would have given him an A+! This version of the flag has been in use for the longest period of time – 63 years.

Today's US flag has thirteen red and white horizontal stripes and a blue rectangle in the upper left corner with fifty, five-pointed white stars arranged in nine rows, six-star rows alternating with five-star rows. The stars represent the 50 states of the union, and the stripes symbolize the original 13 British colonies that declared independence from England on July 4, 1776.



The official colors for US government flags are White, No. 70001, Old Glory Red, No. 70180, and Old Glory Blue, No. 70075. Other colors have been used for mass market reproductions. The colors have meaning. White signifies purity and innocence, red represents hardiness and valor, and blue stands for vigilance, perseverance, and justice. An American flag is flown year-round at many public buildings and is seen more frequently in private use on Presidents' Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, and Veterans' Day. The flag is continuously displayed at the White House, the

Washington Monument, and the airport terminals in Boston and Newark in memoriam of the lives lost on September 11, 2001. Flags also fly at the South Pole, on the moon, and at many businesses and sporting events.

In 1942, Congress adopted the United States Flag Code that provides a detailed set of rules for the proper use, display, and disposal of the flag. Guidelines include folding the fabric, keeping the flag from touching the ground, and raising and lowering it. The Code is not widely enforced. The flag is not supposed to be copied on apparel, decorative items, or furnishings, for example, but this commonly occurs. And there is no penalty for failing to observe the Code. In fact, interpretations of Old Glory can be found on many consumer items, folk art pieces, and artists' works.



Americans have a special feeling for their flag. It is an iconic symbol that has played a large part in the social, political, and emotional life of the citizens of this nation. Emblematic of the USA's treasured history, long may this banner wave "o'er the land of the free and the home of the brave."
